Find Made by Trainmen on the Cut Off Between Hunts and Cuba. Coroner Granted Death Certificate---Body at Dalton Undertakers

Mount Morris, Match M --Trainmen or an End freight, while ranging on the new cusoff between Hunts and Cuba this moreing, found the body of a dead man in one of the gondulan, commonly known as coal cars. The body was taken from the car to the depot at Hunts and Coroner Frederick J. Bowen, of this village, was summoned.

Corourt Bowrn, after making an examination of the body, concluded that death had resulted from beart disease, withough there was a small cut on his head. It was probably received by the unfortunate man when he fell to the holtom of the car after being stricken with a fatal attack of beart trouble.

Cards found on the dead tubn's person woold indicate that his name was Frank Connors, and that he was a boller maker by trade. Some parts of the cards were rom and illegible, but one of them have a register number of 2173. This came card also boye the following: "initiated 1908, Local No. 23, Bayonne, N. J." Another card bad this on it: "Nov. 28, 1906, Subordinate Lodge No. 7, Buffalo, N. Y."

Copnors was evidently about 28 years old, f feet 9 inches . L and weighed fietween 130 and 300 pounds. Hy had brown hats, no heard, and his clothes were fairly good Two handherchiefs, a wake of somp and 45 cents was also found on the person, but oothing that would lead to locating relalives. Coroner Bowen issued a certificate of death from natural causes, and ordered. the body removed to the rooms of Undertaker Smith at Dalton, where it will be kept for a short time, while an effort is being made to locate his friends or relatives.

Despite Every Effort to Save Him He Succumbs.

Seneca Falls, March 18.-Samuel Deck er, who took Paris green with suicidal intent a week ago, succumbed to acute gastritle caused by the poisoning last night. Mr. Decker died at the home of his son. John Decker, a short distance northwest of Seneca Fulls, where he has made his bome for three years. Mr. Decker was 73 years old. Corosee Dr. William M. The large cakes of ice are expected to form a jam shore the Geneseo bridge as is done every year, but dynamite has always been effectual in removing any dangetous conditions, and will be used this year if necessary.


